About

Shannon Zachary is head of the Department of Preservation and Conservation, which coordinates binding, book repair, and conservation for the University of Michigan Library. She also teaches library and archive preservation as an adjunct lecturer in the School of Information.

Background

Shannon Zachary has worked in preservation at the University of Michigan Library since 1994 and has been head of the Department of Preservation and Conservation since 2005. She began studying bookbinding and conservation with Anne and Theodore Kahle at the Capricornus School of Bookbinding in Berkeley, California. Subsequently she earned a City and Guilds of London Institute Certificate in Bookbinding at Brunel Technical College in Bristol, England, in 1984, and a Higher National Diploma in paper conservation at the Camberwell College of Art in London in 1986. She was book conservator for rare and special collections at the Cornell University Library from 1987 to 1992 before moving to Ann Arbor to earn a master's degree in library studies at the University of Michigan.

Kate DeGood has been dancing for 20 years with over 80 major titles in the US, Canada, Scotland and Australia including numerous World Championships. She is currently Highland Dance Director at Alma College and Director of the Kate DeGood School of Dance at the Detroit St. Andrew's Society. David has been the pipe major of the St. Andrews Society for 40 years. He has competed professionally in Scotland, Canada and in the US winning awards including Champion Supreme in Canada. He is one of only a few American pipers to hold the Piobaireachd Society of London Gold Medal.


Professor MacFarlane's presentation will focus on 18th century dress in Scotland. In 1746 the defeat of the mostly Highland army at Culloden resulted in many dramatic changes in Scotland. Culturally, one of the most significant changes was the banning of kilts, tartan fabric, and the traditional clothing of the Highlanders. This talk will deal with the significance of these changes and the nature of Scottish dress at the high point in the evolution of Highland garb.

Several modern reproduction garments will be displayed. The talk will conclude with a question and answer period, open to the discussion of any aspect of 18th century Scotland.

A Day With Dr. Durie

On Saturday March 18, 2017

Dr. Bruce Durie BSc(Hons) PhD OMLJ FSAScot FCollT FIGRS FHEA QG Bruce Durie is considered one of Scotland's top genealogists, with an international reputation. He is perhaps best known for his BBC radio series, "Digging Up Your Roots" (eighth season in 2014), and "A House with A Past", and he has authored 30 books, including the best-selling "Scottish Genealogy" now in its 3rd edition. (www.brucedurie.co.uk/books). His background is in medicine and neuropharmacology, as well as holding a doctoral degree in history. Bruce founded the much-acclaimed Postgraduate Program in Genealogical Studies at the University of Strathclyde in Glasgow, which he headed for six years as Course Director, until 2011. Now a Fellow at Strathclyde, he has developed a full-time, online, one-year Masters Genealogical Studies programme and instigated the PhD programme in Genealogy, soon to start. He also teaches courses on Genealogy, Documents and Heraldry at the University of Edinburgh. Elected to the prestigious Académie Internationale de Généalogie (the only member from Scotland), he is Shennachie (Genealogist and Historian) to the Chief of Durie, and official Shennachie to COSCA (Council of Scottish Clans and Associations). He was on the Council of the 2016 International Congress of Genealogical and Heraldic Sciences, held in Glasgow, August

2016. He is one of the Founding Members of the Register of Qualified Genealogists (www.qualifiedgenealogists.org) and of two new scholarly journals in the genealogy field. Bruce was Fulbright Senior Scottish Studies Scholar, spending seven months of 2016 researching Scottish Migration at St Andrews University, Laurinburg, North Carolina, USA.
