Private Book Collection donated to the Low Library:

The Library Staff wants to recognize Roger Schebor who graciously gave his carefully chosen collection from his home library to the Low Library. Many wonderful muchloved books from a lifetime of gathering which included the help of a curator to be able to put together this type of collection. These books include the complete collection of the Waverly novels by Sir Walter Scott as an example. The Library Staff will be going thru these books in the coming weeks to identify which will be available for checking out of the Library and what books can only be viewed in the Library. More information on this collection will be made available in a future Highland Fling. We will also display these books during our Membership meeting in the coming months. Roger, know that we will treasure this collection and are humbled by your trust in us.




