The June 2020 Benevolence is the [William H. Kincaid Scottish Arts Scholarship](#) Program. The Society is pleased to provide \$10,000 to the program this year from money received from the Highland Games Raffle ticket sales. The Kincaid Scholarship director, St. Andrew's Society Pipe Major Dave Martin, reports that 37 individuals received scholarships in the past year.

William (Bill) H. Kincaid joined St. Andrew's Society of Detroit in December 1985 and is a current member. He chaired the Highland Games at Historic Fort Wayne in 1988. He served as Society Treasurer, and served as President 1991-1992. In 1994, having been involved in Highland Dance lessons with his own family and friends, he started a Scholarship Fund at SASD to encourage young people to get involved and participate in our Highland Games. He ran the Scholarship program for many years. In 2003, the Society President, Peg Dunlop, renamed the Scholarship Program to honor Bill and his wonderful contributions to the Society.

The St. Andrew's Society of Detroit is very proud of its **Kincaid Scholarship** program and the number of scholarship grants and the number of years that the program has been in effect for students and instructors studying and teaching the Scottish arts. The program offers modest scholarships for pipers, drummers, highland dancers, harpists (clarsach), fiddlers, pianists, and other Scottish musical arts to further their interest and improve their skills. Scholarships may be for a variety of schools, camps, clinics, or workshops, whether short-term or week-long programs, as approved by the Kincaid Scholarship program. In awarding scholarships, preference is given to school-age applicants and to first-time applicants of any age. Instructors desiring to improve their teaching skills also may receive scholarships.

We are fortunate to be entertained by scholarship recipients at our monthly meetings and Fish Frys.

The COVID-19 Response Fund

In early March, after the shutdown of our economy occurred, Bob and Louise Giles sent an email asking how we could help those affected by the Coronavirus. They suggested that the Society make a donation to Portofino Restaurant which is member owned, to allow them to make a Scottish Sunday Dinner for the Healthcare workers at the Wyandotte Henry Ford Hospital. This would aid a restaurant that could no longer serve food inside their establishment and feed those essential workers during the pandemic.

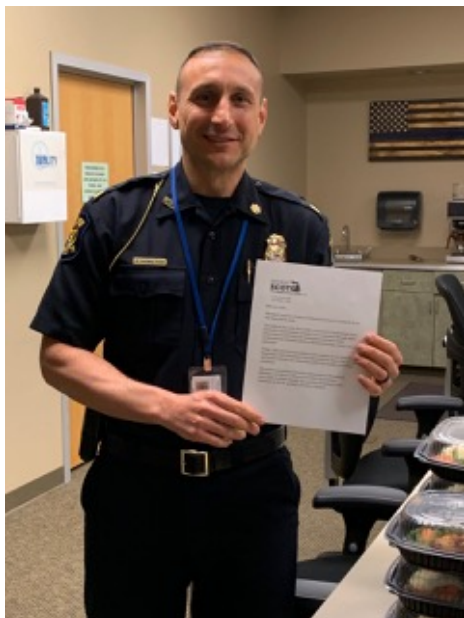
Our Board of Trustees approved the establishment of the Fund with \$2000 donated from our Highland Games and another \$1000 already in our Donation account from our website. This \$3000 was sent to Portofino and the feeding began.

Your Communications Team also went to work, raising additional funds via Social Media and on our website, www.detroitscots.com. Members also made donations by sending in checks to the Hall. Without our wonderful, caring, and generous members, this would not have been possible to help those in need.

Overall, we have accomplished a wonderful task! Not only feeding the Hospital workers, but also the Police Department in Wyandotte.

A special COVID-19 Response Fund Committee was formed to select charities to receive the COVID-19 Response Fund donations. Because of the generosity of our members and the community, the St. Andrew's Society of Detroit is able to provide \$1,000 to each of the five charities that the committee selected.

The charities are Morse Elementary School in the Troy School District, Fort Street Presbyterian Church-Open Door Ministry, Capuchin Soup Kitchen, Turning Point, and Salvation Army for their COVID-19 Support programs. In addition, \$250 is being donated to the Children's Hospital of Michigan Clothes Closet through the Shower of Love.

Even more important though, is the reason that we sell these tickets. Our Scholarship Program that supports young people who are studying Scottish Arts, keeping our traditions alive. Not many families can afford the full cost of this over many years. Other cultures are finding their arts disappearing. **But the Detroit Scots have the foresight and heart to keep the Scottish Arts alive!**

Tell them how we spend that money, not for our operations, but for education, for young people, for keeping our Scottish culture alive in the future. Highlights from the Highlands

Here in Ballachulish, Glencoe and Duror villages, the communities have really rallied round and organized into a Resilience Group with volunteers supporting the more vulnerable people who simply have to isolate COMPLETELY and those who are in financial hardship. The team is wonderful, led by Red Angus (Angus MacInnes originally from the island of Eriskay, but here from childhood) and our local councilor Niall MacLean. They immediately swung into action to get things going to protect local people. Just as 'lockdown' was announced, the local area, and incidentally the whole of the Highlands, was inundated by droves of people from the South of the country, and even from Europe, in camper vans, and heading for self-catering establishments, and second homes.

Our Resilience team in Ballachulish was on national TV twice as an example of great community spirit. Every household was issued with two cards, one green, one red, and we place them in our front window to indicate if we are fine or need help from the volunteers. Red Angus and his team go round every house in the morning and again in the evening to see who has the red thumb up. If so, they contact the household to organize what they need. It's working so very well. We also set up our own village food bank at the Village Hall and built a hand washing station outside the local shop. We have halted the virus so far, but we dread any relaxation of the lock-down as the Highlands will be the 'go to' place for day trippers, etc.

You can look at the [Ballachulish Resilience Group Covid-19 Facebook](#) pages, and I can recommend a wee video made by a local group on YouTube 'Ballachulish Photon Somewhere over the Rainbow', Aileen sings and it shows the village in lock-down, you'll see Angus on his bike patrolling the village, and Niall and the team building the wash station overnight, the local shop staff, medical centre, etc. Nice views above the village looking down the Loch too!

Book Banter from the Low Library

This lovely, oversized book is a panel by panel look at the Great Tapestry of Scotland which depicts the last 12,000 years of Scotland's history in 160 embroidered panels. It's described by the BBC as "a tapestry that distills Scotland's unique sense of herself, to tell a story only of this place,... to ask the heart-welling rhetorical question: "What's like us?" The panels were drawn by artist Andrew Crummy and then stitched by over 1,000 Scots. They depict major historical events like the clearances and everyday occurrences like a group of women waulking cloth. It will be installed in its own building in Galashiels in the Spring of 2021. In the meantime, you can view it in this book and on the website www.scotlandstapestry.com where there is an audio tour of the Tapestry exhibit tour. These may be the only places you can see the panel on the Rosslyn Chapel - someone stole it! Stop by the Low Library after June and you can see or even check out the book yourself.
