# Children's Hospital of Michigan's Clothes Closet And the Shower of Love

Twenty-one years ago, three ladies that I have been friends with since first grade and I decided to give a 'Baby Shower' for needy children. We searched around to see what the best way would be to do this one-time event. We chose to associate with the Clothes Closet of Children's Hospital of Michigan for many reasons. Every indigent baby who is discharged from the hospital is given a complete layette to help them get started and older children are given new clothes to take home.

We started planning our event, The Shower of Love. The first year we had about 50 friends and family members there to support our project. We asked each guest to bring an unwrapped item for the babies we were helping. Many came that first year with more than one item from a list of suggested items that we sent them. As the guests left that evening they all said, "see you next year"... so our one-time event was now going to have a 2nd Annual! The volunteer staff at the Clothes Closet was delighted.

At the fourth Annual Shower of Love, I invited a few fellow members of the St. Andrew's Society of Detroit. By this time, the attendance at the Shower was about 120. The members of the St. Andrew's Society were so impressed with our shower, they asked the asked if they could 'piggyback' on to the shower and hold a mini-Shower of Love at a general membership meeting. Those members also petitioned the Trustees and the Benevolence Committee to provide matching funds from the Middlemas Matching Fund program to any member who made a cash donation. The St. Andrew's Society has held a mini-Shower of Love for the past fifteen years. The Society will match any cash/check donation that members donate to the Shower of Love. This is done through the Middlemas Matching Program of the Society. Each year at the main Shower of Love, the St. Andrew's Society of Detroit is recognized and honored. It makes me so proud to be a member of both groups.

#### This year we are trying something new!

I know that many of you like to shop for this event instead of writing checks. Clothing for babies is so appealing to many and the sales in the stores and online are fantastic. Also, many of the members of the SASD like to knit or crochet for the babies. So, this year those members who would like to shop or use their talents to make something for the children, you can drop off the items at the **Kilgour Scottish Centre** on **Saturday, May 15th from 1 to 4 pm**. You can just bring it to the hall and there will be someone in the parking lot ready to accept your donations. You will not need to go into the hall or have any close contact with those accepting the items.

The Clothes Closet of Children's Hospital of Michigan has over 10,000 requests a year from nurses, social workers, and doctors. Yes, 10,000! Despite the Pandemic that we have all lived through the past year these requests keep coming. The needs of the children and their families are still there. The requests are not only for babies, but for children up to the age of 17. Through the years the stories that we have heard from the medical staff and the social workers about how much the parents of these kids appreciate the items, are heartwarming. Sometimes we hear the thanks from the kids themselves. Those thank you's are amazing.

The Clothes Closet is just that at the Children's Hospital of Michigan. It is a room (closet) filled with all kinds of clothes for children. There is everything from winter jackets to sweatshirts and sweat pants for older kids, underwear, outfits for newborn children, play clothes, sweaters, hats, mittens, dresses, slacks, and everything else that kids need. The medical staff on the floors with the kids assess the needs of the kids and informs the Clothes Closet staff of what is needed, size wise. Then the kids get the items, frequently with a teary eyed parent watching.





#### A Coat of Arms - what an achievement!

Increasingly citizens of the USA enquire about the possibility of acquiring an official and legal coat of arms from the Lyon Court in Scotland. **Dr Bruce Durie** explains the process.

You will have seen those 'Your Family Crest' adverts on websites, in magazines, booths at expos, Games and Gatherings and the like. They are, at the very least, misleading and in some cases simply duplicitous. The only way to get arms is to apply properly to the correct Heraldic Authority.

This whole area is filled with misconceptions. I am often asked:

- 'Don't we already have a Family crest?'
  - No, and for two reasons
  - First, the crest is not the same as the shield. The crest is the element above the helmet atop the shield (Figure 1).
  - Second, there is no such thing is a 'Family Coat of Arms' in Scotland.
- 'But I've seen arms for my family name, and I can get it from a website'.

  What you've seen are the arms of someone of a similar surname, dead or living. In Scottish heraldic law (yes, 'law' as in 'statute') a coat of arms is the property of one person at a time and inheritable. If you share a surname with arms you have seen on a website or elsewhere, it may be that you have a claim to them, or a variant, but you are not justified in simply adopting and using them, any more than you could drive someone's car

or live in their house just because your surnames are the same.

Try using them in Scotland, and you find yourself fined and any property with those Arms on confiscated!

- 'Doesn't that mean everyone with the same surname has the same arms?'
  Not exactly it's an accepted practice that people with similar surnames, including those in cadet branches, will have obviously similar arms. That make arms a bit like a pictorial family tree, but which branch would you be in? (Figure 2)
- 'Surely you can't get Scottish arms unless you live in Scotland?' Well, there are ways around that read on!
- 'Isn't Heraldry just for the great and the good, or the rich and titled?'.

  Scotland is extremely egalitarian about this. Basic Arms are for the 'virtuous and well deserving', irrespective of wealth, social class, title or noble ancestry.
- 'Isn't it difficult and expensive?'
  Frankly, it is usually not straightforward and does take time. Professional help from an experienced genealogist and heraldist may be necessary. However, the cost is comparable to a family holiday or a small second-hand car, and the arms can be passed on down the generations.

But if you do decide to go ahead, you will be joining a tradition that stretches back reliably to the time of Robert Bruce and possibly a century before that.

- 'Great! My grandmother on my mother's side was a MacDribble. Can I get Arms?'
  Not on that basis. Arms are all about surname, so you need to have Scottish ancestors on your surname side.
- 'Does it matter if we're a Clan or a Family?'
  No, these are of equal status and each may have a Chief, recognised by the Lord Lyon as 'Chief of Name and Arms'. Clans are Highlands and (partly) the Borders. The Lowlands has Families, and there are more Lowlands Families than Highlands or Borders Clans

#### Getting arms properly.

The Heraldic Authority in Scotland is the Lyon Court, headed up by the Lord Lyon, backed by the full power of statute from the 1500s and still in force. The Lord Lyon is three people rolled into one – head of the Heraldic Authority as a judge in his own court; a Minister of State in the Scottish Government; and the Queen's representative in matters heraldic and ceremonial. The Lord Lyon matriculates existing arms and grant new ones, with the details added to the *Public Register of All Arms and Bearings in Scotland*. The *Register* in its present form goes back to 1672, although the granting and recording of arms is far older.

Strictly speaking, Arms can only be granted to someone within the Lord Lyon's jurisdiction. The main categories are these:

- if you were born in Scotland, or if you are normally domiciled (a legal concept), mainly live and/or have substantial property in Scotland, you can petition for a new grant of Arms in your own right, or re-matriculate those of an armigerous (Arms-bearing) ancestor;
- even if you don't live in Scotland, if an ancestor in your surname had Arms granted in Scotland, possibly these can be re-matriculated in your name (if you are the lineal descendant), or with a 'difference' (if you descend from a collateral branch);

• if no ancestor had Arms, but your ancestor came from Scotland, Arms may be granted retrospectively, with a cadet matriculation to you and your heirs.

In all these cases you will require a correctly-constructed petition to the Lyon Court in Edinburgh, establish a pedigree, and present a properly-constructed set of proofs.

#### **Petitioning the Lyon Court**

Whether you decide to petition for Arms on the basis of the Arms previously granted to an ancestor, or whether you are starting from scratch, you will have to prove that you are a descendant of someone in your surname from Scotland, and whether in the senior line or a cadet branch of that surname. This requires Strict Proofs.

Proofs are not 'I found a family tree online...' or 'our family has always said that...' or 'I read it in a book'. You have to prove everything to a judicial standard, and present legal documents to back it up. That usually means finding the birth, marriage, death and other records of that ancestor and everyone else down to you – and that's originals or legal, certified copy-extracts, not simply downloads or photostats. Yes, it's onerous but it's doable – and many do it.

This may mean contacting or visiting local courthouses or other repositories in America, and eventually getting legal Scottish documents. Some people hire a professional genealogist, some like to do it themselves. Many find it easier to have a Scottish genealogist obtain the ones in Scotland, and to search for armigerous ancestors (because you never know!)

#### Making the petition.

Once the proofs are in hand, it's necessary to construct a petition written in a particular format, 'praying' that Lord Lyon will grant or re-matriculate Arms. This is accompanied by a 'schedule of proofs', listing and describing the documents, plus the documents themselves, which will be returned to you after copying by the Lyon Office in Edinburgh.

The Lyon Office requires a Lodging Fee, currently £450 (about \$620 US) as a non-refundable deposit against the full eventual fee if Arms are granted. The final cost for shield, crest and motto – the usual combination – is likely to be in the region of £2,075 (close to \$3,000), barring any extra "embellishments" you may decide to have added to your Letters Patent – the painted vellum scroll that will eventually turn up (Figure 3).

However, it is usually a good idea to have someone experienced to amass the schedule of proofs, construct the Petition, help you design Arms the Lord Lyon is likely to approve, deal with queries throughout the process, and so on. Count on spending at least £3,500 or \$5,000 in total, and be aware the process can take a year or more depending on complexity, the number of requests already in the queue and so on.

#### What about England, Ireland and Canada?

• If your ancestors are from England, apply to the College of Arms in London (<a href="http://www.college-of-arms.gov.uk/services/granting-arms">http://www.college-of-arms.gov.uk/services/granting-arms</a>) This is more expensive than in Scotland, and has extra strictures, which includes demonstrating that you are a person of 'eminence or good standing in national or local life', but that may just be having a university degree, holding political office or just being prominent in your community.

- Likewise, those with Irish ancestors should apply to the Chief Herald of Ireland in Dublin (http://www.nli.ie/en/applying-for-a-grant-of-arms.aspx).
- Canada has its own Heraldic Authority, to which anyone living in Canada, or of Canadian ancestry, should apply (<a href="https://www.gg.ca/en/heraldry/apply-coat-arms-flag-badge">https://www.gg.ca/en/heraldry/apply-coat-arms-flag-badge</a>)

#### The first steps

Have your pedigree assessed by a professional genealogist and heraldist in Scotland, who will be able to advise further and pull together the various proofs. You may find you are descended from an armigerous ancestor, or related to someone who has Arms, or that you are starting afresh.

Of course, you could simplify the whole thing by deciding to move to Scotland, or buy some land and a dwelling and live there predominantly – but make sure it's more than five acres, and not some dubious 'souvenir plot'!

And if you can't make the jump back in time and across the pond because of a genealogical brick wall, but your Scottish ancestors were in America before 3 September1783, you're in luck. The Lord Lyon may find jurisdiction, as that was when Britain stopped pretending it was in charge of America.




Figure 1. The crest is just one aspect of overall Arms. In Scottish Arms, the motto usually goes at the top.

#### **NOTIFICATION:**

- Member or representative should send an email to <u>secondvp@detroitscots.com</u>. Officer (2nd VP or President) will gather pertinent details and determine whether or not member wishes information to be sent out in an Eblast.
- Officer will notify Flower Coordinator, Pam Thomson, who will send flowers/card as appropriate.
- Flower arrangements not to exceed \$70+delivery for a funeral and \$50+delivery for a hospital. If member designates charity in lieu of flowers, Flower Coordinator Pam Thomson will notify the Society Treasurer.
- Officer also will notify FLING Editor (if message is to be Eblast), Society Chaplain, and Membership Secretary for Society records. If event has already taken place, this procedure will still be followed.
