

The History of the Shower of Love

Twenty-two years ago, three ladies that I have been friends with since first grade and I decided to give a 'Baby Shower' for needy children. We searched around to see what would be the best way to do this onetime event. We chose to associate with the <u>Clothes Closet of Children's Hospital of Michigan</u> for many reasons. Every indigent baby who is discharged from the hospital is given a complete layette to help them get started and older children are given new clothes to take home. Many of these children have been abused and are going to foster care or shelters. Many are victims of fire.

We started planning our event, *The Shower of Love*. The first year we had about 50 friends and family members there to support our project. We asked each guest to bring an unwrapped item for the babies we were helping. Many came that first year with more than one item from a list of suggested items that we sent them. As the guests left that evening, they all said, "see you next year"... so our onetime event was now going to have a 22nd Annual! The volunteer staff at the Clothes Closet were delighted.

At the fourth Annual Shower of Love, I invited a few fellow members of the St. Andrew's Society of Detroit. By this time the attendance at the Shower was about 120. The members of the St. Andrew's Society were so impressed with our shower that they asked the asked if they could 'piggy back' on to the shower and hold a mini Shower of Love at a general membership meeting.

Those members also petitioned the Trustees and the Benevolence Committee to provide matching funds from the Middlemas Matching Fund to any member who made a cash donation. The St. Andrew's Society has held a Mini Shower of Love for the past seventeen years.

The Society will still match any cash or check donation that you give to the Shower of Love. You may now also donate through the PayPal button on the Donate page of the detroitscots.com website.

Each year at the main Shower of Love, the St. Andrew's Society of Detroit is recognized and honored. It makes me so proud to be a member of both groups!

Following the Russian invasion of Ukraine, the St. Andrew's Society of Detroit wishes to show support for Ukraine and to help alleviate the suffering caused by this humanitarian crisis. Your support will allow us to provide lifesaving aid to those in need — both in Ukraine and in neighboring countries.

We are asking you for financial support for the Detroit Scots Ukrainian Relief project to provide support for Ukraine.

As fighting in Ukraine continues, the American Red Cross has contributed \$12 million dollars to the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC) to help alleviate the suffering caused by this devastating crisis, as well as to the Danish Red Cross to provide emergency supplies to people displaced within Ukraine. This support allows the Red Cross network to provide lifesaving aid to those in need — both in the country and in neighboring areas.

Role of the American Red Cross

The American Red Cross has donated \$12 million dollars to the IFRC in support the vital work being done in Ukraine and in surrounding countries. These funds support the most vital humanitarian needs including food, shelter, critical care items and first aid.

The American Red Cross has also deployed international crisis responders to Poland, Moldova, Hungary and Romania and other countries to provide humanitarian relief in support of the international Red Cross operation helping families who fled their homes. These highly trained crisis responders . . . are supporting on-the-ground relief efforts alongside local teams, including the Polish Red Cross, Moldovan Red Cross and Romanian Red Cross.

In Ukraine: Aid Amidst the Violence

... Around the clock, teams are providing emergency aid amid fear and uncertainty. Since the conflict intensified on February 24, 2022 Red Cross teams have:

- Distributed more than 1,000 tons of emergency aid, including **food**, **bedding**, **tents**, **water and hygiene items** to more than 300,000 people across Ukraine.
- **Supported the evacuation** of over 58,000 people from the towns of Energodar and Sumy and the Kviy, Kharkiv and Kherson regions.
- Provided first aid training, to more than 42,000 people across the country.
- Assisted with the evacuation of people with disabilities.
- Supported logistics pipelines into Ukraine to ensure critical items can be delivered.
- In Neighboring Countries: ...In Poland, Hungary, Moldova, Belarus, Romania, Russia, Slovakia, Lithuania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Red Cross volunteers are supporting displaced people. Trucks and planes loaded with goods are arriving regularly to provide critical items for those in need . . .

Upcoming Need

In the coming weeks, Red Cross volunteers will increase their work **reuniting separated families**, providing **food** and other **household items**, and increasing awareness about areas contaminated by **unexploded ordnance**. The current needs are tremendous, critical among them include **water delivery**, support to **health** facilities and **medical** care for families wounded.



Low Library Book Club

Ten of us discussed the book *The Royal Stuarts: A history of the Family that Shaped Britain* by Allan Massie. It was interesting to see how the abilities of each monarch varied. There was the incompetent James II (who consorted with "inappropriate people") and was rated a failure. The author highly approved of James VI & I however (he calls the king "highly intelligent, a scholar and poet" and "a canny politician). It gave a nice summary of Scottish history from 1406-1714 with a chapter on the Jacobites. We all enjoyed it and would recommend it to the membership.



Our next book discussion will be on Monday, June 13 at 5:30pm (EDT). The book will be **As the Women Lay Dreaming** by **Donald S. Murray**. The book will be published in the U.S. May 3rd, but there are copies available on Kindle and Nook now and from Amazon (British copies). Mr. Murray will be speaking at the Kilgour in October. Here is a summary of the novel:

In the small hours of January 1st, 1919, the cruelest twist of fate changed at a stroke the lives of an entire community.

Tormod Morrison was there that terrible night. He was on board HMY lolaire when it smashed into rocks and sank, killing some 200 servicemen on the very last leg of their long journey home from war. For Tormod, a man unlike others, with artistry in his fingertips, the disaster would mark him indelibly.

Two decades later, Alasdair and Rachel are sent to the windswept Isle of Lewis to live with Tormod in his traditional blackhouse home, a world away from the Glasgow of their earliest years. Their grandfather is kind, compassionate, but still deeply affected by the remarkable true story of the lolaire shipwreck, by the selfless heroism and desperate tragedy he witnessed.

A deeply moving novel about passion constrained, coping with loss, and a changing world, **As the Women Lay Dreaming** explores how a single event can so dramatically impact communities, individuals and, indeed, our very souls.




