## A Letter from the President


Summer Greetings All,

## **Our Benevolences**

#### **Ukrainian Fundraiser**

Thank you for your contributions to the **Detroit Scots Ukrainian Relief** appeal for donations to the Red Cross to help with the humanitarian crisis. Members, friends, and the Society donated \$4,045.

### Kincaid Scholarships

Scholarships have been given to two young women who are our previous scholarship students to defray costs associated with their travel to, accommodations, and participation in the Edinburgh Royal Military Tattoo this summer, for which they auditioned and were selected. They will be in Edinburgh for 6 weeks.

At the writing of this article all of the contents of the Library, Classroom and Office are in the Burns room ready to be moved back on Wednesday the 29th of June. The long wait for the renovation of the building after all of the water damage will soon be over and the Kilgour Centre will once again come back to life. The Library Committee is especially excited to once again be able to be in the Library to continue on with the work of the Society. The Society as a whole was hit with the ONE-TWO punch with the pandemic and then the water damage that certainly has had an impact to our operations.

For many years, the Library Committee has met every month, rain or shine, pandemic or building closure to work and plan for the library's current projects as well as planning for the future. The new word that everyone seemed to be saying is ZOOM. Zoom has had a major impact on how corporations and organizations were able to conduct their business during the pandemic. The library was no exception, we began immediately meeting every month connecting not only locally but with Cathy McCullough Les in California and Teri Mago in New York. Though these remote meetings were and are part of how the library conducts it's business, we need to be in the library to do a large percentage of the work. The committee has and is looking at software that makes working on material and documents remotely easier and more efficient.

We are excited to welcome Beth Stireman to the library as a Contributor. Beth just recently joined the Society after moving to the area. She offered to help the Library in digitizing of our Society documents, something that we have been wanting to do for a very long time. Thank you Beth for being part of the Library and helping us move forward with this very important project.

The library is already planning to once again sponsor programs for the membership and the community.

In October, Scottish novelist, poet and playwright Donald Murray will be in the Kilgour Centre talking about two of his books "As the Woman Lay Dreaming" and "In a Veil of Mist". He will also talk about the research he is doing in the Detroit area for his new book about the role the Scots played in the auto industry. We are working with a local bookstore to have his books available for purchase and signing by Mr. Murray.

IN March of 2023, plans are beginning to have representatives from the Ulster Historical Foundation to make the Kilgour one their stops on their North American tour. The library will work with our Genealogist Derek Blount (foundation member) to make this an exciting and worthwhile event. More information in the months to come.


## **Charles S. Low Library Book Club**

At our June meeting, the Low Library Book Club discussed **As the Women Lay Dreaming** by Donald S. Murray.

The HMY lolaire sank after hitting the rocks on its approach to Stornoway harbor on the Isle of Lewis very early on New Year's Day 1919. The men on board were traveling home at the end of WWI. They'd survived the war but many of them never made it home. Two hundred and one of them died that night. This story shows the impact the disaster had on the men who survived, their families, and the whole island community.


We were impressed with the depiction of the characters, especially the boy Alistair and his grandfather Tormod. Tormod survived the sinking but, like many of the survivors, never got over it. My favorite scene is when the 2 half-orphaned children from Glasgow enter a blackhouse for the first time: with the hearth in the middle of the floor (earthen), no running water, and a partitioned area for the livestock. What a shock!

The author grew up on the Isle of Lewis and his descriptions of the land and the life of its people made you feel as if you were there, walking the fields and feeling the wind. We highly recommend this book and are looking forward to the author's visit in October.



The book for our next meeting on September 19 is **Two Closes and a Referendum** by Mary McCabe.

An engaging tale of ordinary people in an extraordinary time. This novel brilliantly captures the growing excitement and fervor of the 2014 Independence Referendum that changed Scotland forever. Set in Glasgow's East End, the novel follows its characters as they explore their identity and wrestle with the hopes and fears that surround the choice they are asked to make. Mary McCabe has written a compelling novel where human drama meets political activism.


