



The theme for SNACC 2022 is: "How do We in North America Express Our Scottishness." The Conference is organized by a coalition of Scottish heritage organizations which include:

The American Scottish Foundation
The Chicago Scots
Clans and Scottish Societies of Canada

The Detroit Scots
The Scottish Studies Foundation
University of Guelph

The Keynote Speaker for this year's conference is Professor Emeritus Sir Thomas Martine Devine-- Kt, OBE, BA, PhD, DLitt, HonD Univ (Strathclyde, 2006), Hon DLitt (Queen's, Belfast, 2001), Hon DLitt (Abertay, Dundee, 2001), FRHistS, FSAScot, FRSE, Hon MRIA, FBA.

Tom Devine, is the Sir William Fraser Professor Emeritus of Scottish History and Palaeography in the University of Edinburgh, the world's oldest and most prestigious chair in the field. Before then he was Glucksman Research Professor of Irish and Scottish Studies at Aberdeen and Professor of Scottish History at Strathclyde, where he also became Deputy Principal in the 1990s.

He is the author or editor of over forty books, several of which have become international best sellers, and around 100 articles in academic journals and book collections. His most renowned work is The Scotland Trilogy, an epic three volume series of over 1600 pages in total, published by Penguin Random House, on the history of the Scottish people at home and across the world since the sixteenth century.

The Times noted in 2013 that 'Tom Devine is as close to a national bard of Scotland as the nation has'. The Scottish Field in 2014noted that 'Sir Tom Devine is the rock star of Caledonian historians whose work in unraveling Scottish identity makes him de facto the father of the nation.' The Financial Times concluded in 2021 that Devine is 'Scotland's most distinguished historian since Thomas Carlyle (1795-1881)'.

Conference Panels will include discussions on Clan and Family Societies, Communications Within Scottish North America, Highland Games, The Robert Burns World Federation, St. Andrew's Societies, Burns Dinners, Tartan Week, Expressions In Tartan Fashion, and Scottish Events in North American 2023.



Shortbread Contest Results By Christy Haradean

The 2022 St. Andrew's Society of Detroit 173rd Highland Games Annual Shortbread Contest was just absolutely fantastic this year! We had the so much fun and it was an honor judging the most entry samples ever submitted!

And here is Shirley Davidson's Award-Winning Recipe for the... Most Amazing Millionaire Shortbread

It is a trio combination of a Shortbread Layer, a Caramel Layer, and topped with a decadent Chocolate Ganache Layer. Ingredients:

Shortbread Layer	Caramel Layer	Ganache
 1 Cup Butter 2 cup Flour ½ cup Powdered Sugar ¼ Tsp. Salt 	 2 – 14 oz. Cans Sweetened Condensed Milk 14 Tbs. of Butter cut into pieces 1 cup Light Brown Sugar 1/3 tsp. Light Corn Syrup 1 tsp. Vanilla ½ tsp. Salt 	2 cups Dark Chocolate Chips ½ Cup Heavy Whipping Cream ½ Tsp. Vanilla Sea Salt for Sprinkling

Instructions:

-Shortbread Bottom Layer

Preheat oven to 350°. Mix Flour & Sugar in a large bowl, add salt & butter and mix together. Mixture will be crumbly) Press into bottom of parchment paper lined 9x13 pan and poke randomly with a fork. Bake at 350° for 20-25 minutes, until edges are light brown. Allow to cool, while the caramel layer is prepared.

-Caramel Layer Middle Layer

Combine condensed milk, butter, brown sugar & syrup in a medium saucepan, cook over medium heat. Stir frequently until butter is melted, and candy thermometer reads 225°. Add salt & vanilla. Pour over shortbread crust. Allow to cool several hours, or one hour in refrigerator.

-Chocolate Ganache Top Layer

Heat heavy cream over low heat until almost boiling. Pour over chocolate chips, in a bowl and let rest 3 minutes. Stir until smooth, (if not smooth, heat in microwave for 30 seconds) add vanilla. Pour over the completely cooled caramel and sprinkle with the sea salt. Cool several hours before cutting into pieces. -Enjoy!

Low Family Donation – Longcase "Grandfather" Clock Submitted by: Julie Bartoy, Low Library Committee Member

St. Andrew's Society of Detroit member Stuart Kennedy and his girlfriend Pat Manturuk traveled with their corgi, Autumn, to Shawnee, Kansas in early July to pick up an important donation from the home of Beatrice (Bea) Low Notley. After 12 hours of driving, Stuart put on his kilt and introduced himself to 101-year-old Bea where she presented the donation.

Bea is the older sister to Charles S. (Chuck) Low (1925, Detroit, MI – 2010, Bay City, MI), a past SASD president whose bequest of \$5000 and 200 Scottish books was used to establish the library. On July 2, Stuart and Pat delivered the James Low Clock to the St. Andrew's Society of Detroit's Charles S. Low Memorial Library, where it was installed in the reading room. The George III Longcase Clock (James Low Clock) was built by Bea's ancestor, James Low (c. 1725 – c. 1790) of Arbroath, Scotland in 1755. It was originally designed, built and sold for the family clockmaker business. in 1955 Charles (Charlie) Robbie Low (1885, Arbroath – 1970, Detroit), father to Chuck and Bea, bought the longcase clock in Arbroath, Scotland and shipped it to his home in Detroit, Michigan. In 1957, Charlie gave the clock to his daughter, Bea who was living in Tulsa, Oklahoma at the time.

We are grateful to Beatrice Low Notley for giving this family heirloom to the Charles S. Low Memorial Library and to her daughter, Marianne Notley, who coordinated the donation. The clock is working and ready for viewing. A special thank you to Stuart and Pat for safely transporting the clock.

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Scotland Genealogy Trip 2022

In the spring of this year, we travelled to Scotland with the purpose of visiting as many places as we could where 75% of my ancestors hailed from. I chose to focus on the generation just before those who came to the USA.

Over the years I have accumulated volumes of data, but I did not have burial locations. I decided to contact a genealogist who lives and works in Scotland in the area where many of them lived between Glasgow and Edinburgh. Her work made all the difference in making the trip truly amazing. She set forth a concise plan at the onset so it was easy for me to know exactly what she would be doing. Included in the report she gave me were maps of the relevant areas from the 1800s as well as current maps of the same places. She was able to tell and show me which places still exist. Where needed she included copies of original records. In addition, she made their lives come alive by adding information about what life would have been like in the mid to late 1800s in the coal mining areas of Scotland. She located a group of now renovated miner cottages where one ancestor lived. She was able to locate burial site records that are held in local archives and are not on the internet.

During the trip, we spent considerable time wandering through those cemeteries and looking at old churches. Her report on burial locations included pictures that she had taken which made it easier for us to find approximate burials as none could afford head stones. We also located renovated coal miner cottages that are still standing as well as the Hartwood Asylum where one ancestor died.

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
