### **New Membership System**

Our new Membership System was launched in early October. By now, all our members should have visited the new system, logged in, created a new password, and looked at their profile for correct information. Several members have already paid their 2023 dues! The best news is that you can do all of this on your own!

About a year ago, a team was created to search for a new system for our membership process. This team consisted of Bob Richardson, Emily Wigodski, Rosemary Newton, Doug Reith, Rod Harris, and me. Later, we invited Paula Lupi and Julie Bartoy to join our committee and learn the new system. Our first task was to give our team a name. Being mostly IT retirees, we had to come up with an acronym. We came up with MEDICS – Membership, Events, Documentation, Information, Communication System! Whew! Don't worry none of us have a medical degree!

After spending the first quarter of this year looking at several online systems available, we determined that Wild Apricot was the system that we wanted to look at further. So, we created a free account and added testing data to try it out! So, if you see Mickey Mouse in the directory, don't panic! We may have forgotten to delete him!

By August, we gave ourselves a goal of being ready to launch before the next round of Membership Dues were to be paid for 2023, that is November 1, 2022.

With the Annual Dues letters being sent via email instead of the USPS, we are saving money by not printing and mailing over 400 letters! Our new system allows all our members to pay their dues online or by check.

The new system also allows new applicants for membership to fill out the Membership Application and pay the fee online!

Our members can login into the system and lookup an individual member's email address, home address, and phone number. You can also browse our Society Documents, such as the Highland Fling Newsletters, Membership Meeting Minutes, and others.

As the Fling Editor, I am responsible for communicating with our membership with Eblasts, items of interest, and of course the Highland Fling Newsletter. My plans are to do this with Wild Apricot's Email functionality, so it important that all members login and keep their email address up to date.

In the future, there are many more features of Wild Apricot that we plan to incorporate. Stay tuned!

### **Low Library Book Club**




We have a Movie Star in our Society!

**From Member Marc Harlow:** Clan Buchanan inaugurated its first Chief in 340 years! The ceremony took place on October 9.



### **Memorial for Chuck Forbes**

The passing of Chuck Forbes is sad news, indeed. My deepest sympathy to his family at this time of loss.

But his passing is a loss for many. Detroit, for instance, owes a huge debt of gratitude to Chuck Forbes. Long before Dan Gilbert, Mike and Marion Ilitch, and Peter Karmanos, there was Chuck Forbes. It was this solitary man who looked at a largely vacant downtown Detroit and had the vision to save its icons. With his own money during the 1970s, he purchased closed theaters, including the State, Palms, and the Fox, saving them from a certain date with demolition. His vision was to restore them and eventually have small, medium, and large venues for live shows and entertainment. And he kept buying Detroit architectural gems like the Gem, Elwood Bar & Grill, and the Colony Club. Forbes would proudly point out that his restoration projects were financed with his own money, and he never asked for a handout from the city.

Over the years, I had met him occasionally, and we chatted about our mutual Scottish heritage, but it wasn't until 2016 when he learned about a team project that I had become associated with, the restoration of a huge portrait of Scottish poet Robert Burns, that a true friendship developed. He asked to see what was left of this portrait of Burns by Scottish-born painter Robert Hopkin and brought along his creative restorer, Victor Ashmianets, "just to take a look." The task appeared impossible. The huge canvas, unfurled on the floor of our Kilgour Scottish Centre, was in about twenty-five pieces, some large and some as small as a dime. Clearly its restoration would be a costly years-long project. Our Saint Andrew's Society of Detroit, which owned the painting that once hung in its downtown Detroit St. Andrew's Hall, had raised only a little over half of the anticipated cost.

But the prospect of this project brought together two very important parts of Forbes' life, his Scottish heritage and the restoration of historic Detroit artifacts. He quickly committed to fund the remaining restoration. It took eighteen months for Victor Ashmianets to bring the painting fully back to life.

On January 20, 2019, Chuck beamed at the sight of the painting he helped restore, frame, mount, and illuminate in the Kilgour Scottish Centre in Troy, MI. That dedication dinner was a sweet and emotional moment not only for Chuck Forbes, but also for many of us who helped support this important artistic endeavor. The completion of that work burnishes even brighter the legacy of Chuck Forbes and his impact in restoring and preserving some important Detroit treasures. I knew him as a kind and generous friend willing to spend his time and money to truly make a difference. Thank you, my friend, and, as our Scottish ancestors might say, "mar sin leat" (farewell).

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
