Low Book Club

Six of us met November 14th to discuss *A Croft in the Hills* by Katharine Stewart. It was an enjoyable read about her family's life on a croft near Loch Ness in the 1950's. There was no big drama but her descriptions of their every day life - feeding the cows and chickens, planting the turnips, harvesting the potatoes and wheat, the help from neighbors just when they needed it - made you feel you had been there with them. And who knew there were hurricanes in the middle of Scotland?! Several of the club members had family who had lived on farms and they agreed that Stewart's story showed how hard - and rewarding - that life is. One of the things that stuck out was their little girl walking to school over the fields and a brook at the age of 5 or 6! We heartily recommend this book to all.



Our next meeting will be on February 13th at 5:30pm (EST) via Zoom. We'll be discussing Death of a Chief (John MacKenzie, #1) by Douglas Watt. Here's the description:

The year is 1686. Sir Lachlan MacLean, chief of a proud but poverty-stricken Highland clan, has met with a macabre death in his Edinburgh lodgings. With a history of bad debts, family quarrels, and some very shady associates, Sir Lachlan had many enemies. But while motives are not hard to find, evidence is another thing entirely.

It falls to lawyer John MacKenzie and his scribe Davie Scougall to investigate the mystery surrounding the death of the chief, but among the endless possibilities, can reason prevail in a time of witchcraft, superstition and religious turmoil? This thrilling tale of suspense plays out against a wonderfully realized backdrop of pre-Enlightenment Scotland, a country on the brink of financial ruin, ruled from London, a country divided politically by religion and geography. The first in the series featuring investigative advocate John MacKenzie.

Scotland, Poor Law & Lists

Findmypast.com has added 16,820 records into this collection, spanning the years 1816 to 1901. With records for Inverness, Wick, Dreghorn and Perthshire, you may uncover key details about your ancestor's circumstances. You might spot your ancestor's residence and occupation, plus details of disabilities and their financial situation. This collection now has over 120,000 records to explore.

Scotland, Occupations & Professions

A further 16,000 records have been added to this collection. They come from various sources and reach back into the 16th century.

Scotland, Newspapers

Gathered from one of the largest collections in the United Kingdom, FMP British newspapers include thousands of local and regional publications across the England, Wales, and Scotland. Each page has been completely digitized and fully indexed, offering you the ability to search every word within an article. Newspapers are an incredible resource when tracing your family tree as they reveal the daily lives of our ancestors. Local newspapers include more than just announcements of births, marriages, and deaths. Local articles include visitors to and from town, legal detailing the settling of estates and land sales, and advertisements.

Local newspapers also provide a glimpse at major national – and local events, through the eyes of the community. The role and story of significant events, such as World War I or tragic events of the devastating world-wide flu epidemic of 1917-1919 are reported through a local lens, allowing you to further understand an ancestor's place within their local community.
