Alma College awards Scottish Arts Scholarships to students with a demonstrated high level of skills in highland dancing, piping, and drumming. The St. Andrew's Society of Detroit is proud to help provide scholarship opportunities to Alma College students to support Scottish arts and heritage.

Drew Duncan, Alma College Pipe Band Director and Coordinator of Highland Arts, will perform with a few scholarship piping students at the April 3 Membership meeting.

In the more than 130 years since its founding, Alma College has stayed true to its roots by keeping its Scottish heritage alive. Here is some background on Alma College's Scottish connection:

Alma College came into existence in 1886 through the efforts of the Presbyterian Synod of Michigan. In 1931, a student won a naming challenge with "The Scots." Because the Presbyterian Church was originally founded in Scotland, the name seemed fitting. Since that time, Alma College has embraced the Scottish traditions.


The Alma College Pipe Band has become an iconic symbol for the college. Bagpipers have led the way for the Kiltie Band and campus events since the 1930s. The marching band is known as the Kiltie Band. The student dance group is known as the Highland Dancers. The Pipe Band and Highland Dancers compete and win awards nationally and internationally.

Alma College's official tartan was adopted in 1996 and was registered with the Scottish Tartan Authority in 1999. The maroon and teal plaid is reflected in the uniforms for the Kiltie Band, Kiltie Highland Dancers, and Pipe Band.

The St. Andrew's Society of Detroit is pleased to make a donation of \$5,000 to the Alma College Scottish Arts Scholarship.

# FLOWER FUND ELIGIBILITY & NOTIFICATION PROCEDURE

The St. Andrew's Society of Detroit Executive Board has agreed to the following:

#### **ELIGIBILITY:**

- Death of member or spouse receives flowers at funeral home. If late, send to the home.
- Death of other immediate family members, member receives card (i.e., father, mother, child).
- Member is hospitalized, flowers are sent to the hospital, or, if released, to the home. Spouse
  receives card if hospitalized. Hospitalization covers surgery, whether emergency or planned; birth
  of baby; illness.

#### **NOTIFICATION:**

- Member or representative should contact the 2nd Vice President, or if unavailable, the President.
   Officer will gather pertinent details and whether member wishes information to be sent out in an Eblast.
- Officer will notify Pam Thomson, who will send flowers/card as appropriate.
- Flower arrangements not to exceed \$60+delivery for a funeral and \$40+delivery for a hospital. If member designates charity in lieu of flowers, Pam Thomson will notify Treasurer.
- Officer also will notify FLING Editor (if message is to be Eblast) and Membership Secretary for Society records. If event has already taken place, this procedure still will be followed.

The committee shall meet quarterly to monitor income, expenditures, and program activities against budget.








# **Low Library Book Club**

Tricked by the uncle who has stolen his inheritance, young David Balfour is kidnapped and bound for America. Or at least that was the plan, until the ship runs into trouble and David is rescued by Alan Breck Stewart, fugitive Jacobite and, by his own admission, a 'bonny fighter'. Balfour, a canny lowlander, finds an echo of some wilder and more romantic self in the willful and courageous Highland spirit of Alan Breck. A strange and difficult friendship is born, as their adventures begin.

**Kidnapped** has become a classic of historical romance the world over and is justly famous as a novel of travel and adventure in the Scottish landscape. Stevenson's vivid descriptive powers were never better than in his account of remote places and dangerous action in the Highlands in the years after Culloden.

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
