Children's Hospital of Michigan's Clothes Closet And the Shower of Love

Twenty-four years ago, three ladies that I have been friends with since first grade and I decided to give a 'Baby Shower' for needy children. We searched around to see what the best way would be to do this one-time event. We chose to associate with the Clothes Closet of Children's Hospital of Michigan for many reasons. Every needy family with a baby who is being discharged from the hospital is given a complete layette to help them get started and older children are given new clothes to take home.

We started planning our event, The Shower of Love. The first year we had about 50 friends and family members there to support our project. We asked each guest to bring an unwrapped item for the babies we were helping. Many came that first year with more than one item from a list of suggested items that we sent them. As the guests left that evening, they all said, "see you next year", so our one-time event was now going to have a 2nd Annual! The volunteer staff at the Clothes Closet was delighted.

At the fourth Annual Shower of Love, I invited a few fellow members of the St. Andrew's Society of Detroit. By this time the attendance at the Shower was about 120. The members of the St. Andrew's Society were so impressed with our shower they asked the asked if they could 'piggyback' onto the shower and hold a mini-Shower of Love at a general membership meeting. Those members also petitioned the Trustees and the Benevolence Committee to provide matching funds from the Middlemas Matching Fund program to any member who made a cash/check donation. The St. Andrew's Society has held a mini-Shower of Love for the past eighteen years. Each year at the main Shower of Love the St. Andrew's Society of Detroit is recognized and honored. It makes me so proud to be a member of both groups.

The Clothes Closet is just that at the Children's Hospital of Michigan. It is a room (closet) filled with all kinds of clothes for children. There is everything from winter jackets to sweatshirts and sweatpants for older kids, underwear, outfits for newborn children, play clothes, sweaters, hats, mittens, dresses, slacks, and everything else that kids need. The medical staff on the floors with the kids assesses the needs of the kids and informs the Clothes Closet staff of what is needed and what sizes. Then the kids get the items, frequently with a teary-eyed parent watching.

If you would like to purchase items for this project, please know in advance how much they will be appreciated. Others of you may just want to make a cash donation. This is an easy task. Just go to the <u>SASD Website</u> and donate directly through the easy process that has been set up for you. 




Sharp Dressed Man!

Low Library Book Club

Six of us got together to talk about *The Way of All Flesh (Raven & Fisher, #1)* by Ambrose Parry (the husband and wife team of Chris Brookmyre and Dr. Marisa Haetzman).



Summary:

Edinburgh, 1847. The novel begins with a dead prostitute, for which the narrative makes an apology. Will Raven is distressed to discover Evie's body, but is quick to sneak away as he does not want to become involved in any possible investigation. He is already in trouble, having borrowed money to give to her with no immediate way of paying it back. He meets with violence very soon from the moneylender who is impatient for repayment. Raven has prospects which he is keen to take up as apprentice medical student to the well regarded Dr. Simpson, the famous "male-midwife," for both the rich ladies of Edinburgh and those who can not

afford to pay. Within hours of arriving at the house of this eminent man he is speeding through the streets to help with a difficult birth, hoping that his inexperience will not show. Meanwhile the reader is introduced to Sarah Fisher, able and intelligent housemaid who heartily wishes she had the opportunity to learn medicine. She helps at Dr. Simpson's clinic which is open to the poor of the city . Dr. Simpson's sister-in-law, Mina, demonstrates that even relatively well off women are still judged by their marriage prospects. As other deaths occur, Raven and Sarah eventually join forces to investigate just what is going on in the world of illicit medicine and controversial treatments. Details of medical procedures and childbirth and experiments with anesthesia occur throughout the story.

Review:

We all enjoyed the book. The characters are all well written and many of the characters in the book actually lived in Edinburgh at the time which adds interest to the story. The medical details and the misconceptions of some of the characters do make you glad not to be living in that time period however. The book ends with a lovely bit of humor. We decided that we wanted to continue our discussion of the story and the people in it and what happens to them, so we'll be reading the next book in the series (The Art of Dying) for our next meeting on June 10 at 5:30 pm on Zoom.

Off The Shelf... Celebrating the Charles S. Low Memorial Library

In 2024, the Charles Low Library has been celebrating the 175th anniversary of the St. Andrew's Society of Detroit by honoring the history of the society. By now you have heard of—and hopefully have been attending—Bruce Gray's lecture series, first on Macbeth's Scotland and most recently on the Highland Clans. We look forward to two more lectures in the series to come later in the year. Additionally, the library committee has set a goal of producing a History of the St. Andrew's Society of Detroit to be copied, bound, and available to any members or public interested. The history is based upon the exhaustive work of the late Fred Wessells, who researched and wrote a history of the society from 1849 to 1999. Other library committee members, led by Julie Bartoy, have expanded upon Fred's work in a second volume focusing on 2000 to 2019. Finally, a third volume will cover 2020 to present.
