- Pasta, barley, and rice
- Pasta sauce or canned tomatoes (especially reduced-sodium and low-sugar)
- Canned fruit (especially 100% fruit or lite-syrup-packed)
- Dried beans, peas, and lentils
- Whole-grain cereal (especially unsweetened and low-sugar)
- · Oatmeal and Cream of Wheat
- Nutritious snacks like dried fruits, nuts, trail mix, and granola bars

The Salvation Army of Metro Detroit's Bed & Bread program serves more nearly 3,500 meals each day to men, women and children who would otherwise go without. That's nearly 1.7 million meals every year. In addition, the Bed & Bread program provides more than 72,000 nights of shelter annually. With this comes a great opportunity for our passionate members to embrace long-respected and vital roles. Here is a list of our open roles and a little about them.

Field Captain - the captain of an incredible crew. Keep people on track and understand the step-by-step process to set up Greenmead for the Games.

Food Vendor - works with existing and recruits new food trucks and food vendors. Finalize placement. Secure power and other needed resources. Coordinate with vendors and Games team.

Opening Ceremony Stage Manager - Get ceremony participants in order and provide directions to those who need it. Send each group out in order. Coordinate with the Clans Liaison and Emcee as needed.

Social Media Team - this is a new role for a team of three to create a strategy for broadcasting live on Games day and executing the final plan. Must be proficient in the use of mobile devices and live streaming.

Tents - Coordinate tent sign-ups and live set-up. Review documentation from the previous chair and plan to be present during key days when tents are being placed

Genealogy - if this is a process (or a quest) that you love, consider stepping into a role that helps others at the beginning of their research.

Volunteer Coordination - this is a key role that can make or break our successful games. Monitor online sign-ups, insure credentials, and t-shirts match. Work with committee chairs to share key information for specific roles. Work closely with tech team coordinating the online sign-up process.

Graphic Design - update existing materials and create new ones as needed. Sufficient experience required.

Online Ticket Sales - set up and monitor the online sales process. Communicate status and issues to Games chair and others, as needed.

Volunteer Catering (during set-up week) - Our current volunteer will stay one more year to mentor a new volunteer. You can go solo as soon as you feel comfortable. Plan throughout the year, use your Games budget to purchase and store/freeze food based on coupons, deals and your own savvy process.

Games Meeting Scribe - are you nimble with your ears and fingers? Are you quick to capture and document meeting notes with many moving pieces? Able to participate in every planning meeting? Capture action items and track them to completion while keeping the Games chair updated?

We'll discuss this at our meeting and you can always contact me or the retiring member with your questions.

I can promise you this: You will work hard and be inspired beyond belief. You will witness the true heart and soul of what it means to be a Scot. Come join us. We'll also have fun and laugh a lot.







This is the book that Donald Murray was writing when he visited our St. Andrew's Society to get information about Detroit. Here is the description:




It's April 21, 1923. The SS Metagama is inching out of Stornoway harbor, Scotland. On board are Finlay and Mairead, young and hopeful, destined for Detroit (via Canada).

On the other side of the Atlantic, the effects of the Great Depression are inescapable. Prejudice and division are rife, and though they remain bound by a shared past, their lives soon diverge.

In an adopted country that is tense with both opportunity and loss, can Mairead and Finlay keep their promises to one another to look only forward, and resist the constant pull of their homeland?

From the author of the prize-winning *As the Women Lay Dreaming* comes a poignant and deeply evocative novel of the 20th-century emigrant experience in the New World. With lyrical prose and masterful storytelling, Murray paints a vivid portrait of the resilient Hebrideans-in-exile who struggled between holding on and letting go.


