At our January 2025 meeting, our members elected one applicant. His name is David Bohde. As a reminder, the 2025 budget approved by the membership at the January meeting includes an increase in the cost of new member applications. The cost is now \$40.

We currently have 16 elected members eligible for our March 3rd Initiation Ceremony. I've been busy working on getting letters sent to those members who have not renewed through their membership account nor through the USPS. The Low Library Book Club has picked *The Lost Lights of St Kilda* by Elisabeth Gifford for our February 10th meeting. Here is the book's description:

When Fred Lawson takes a summer job on St Kilda in 1927, little does he realize that he has joined the last community to ever live on that desolate, isolated island. Only three years later, St Kilda will be evacuated, the islanders near-dead from starvation. But for Fred, that summer is the bedrock of his whole life...

Chrissie Gillies is just nineteen when the researchers come to St Kilda. Hired as their cook, she can't believe they would ever notice her, sophisticated and educated as they are. But she soon develops a cautious friendship with Fred, a friendship that cannot be allowed to develop into anything more...

Years later, to help deal with his hellish existence in a German prisoner of war camp, Fred tells the tale of the island and the woman he loved but left behind. And Fred starts to wonder, where is Chrissie now? And does she ever think of him too?

When Fred makes his daring escape, prompting a desperate journey across occupied territory, he is sustained by one thought only: finding his way back to Chrissie. *The Lost Lights of St Kilda* is a sweeping love story that crosses oceans and decades. It is a moving and deeply vivid portrait of two lovers, a desolate island and the extraordinary power of hope in the face of darkness. '*A gorgeous, melancholy love story*.' The Times

DONATE TO THE FLOWER FUND





Our Charles E. Low Library team has four main responsibilities:

- Managing the Library collections and making them accessible to its membership and the community.
- The display, preservation and security of Library and archived items.
- Updating and maintaining a written history of the Society.
- Maintaining a genealogy research center.

This month we'll be updating you on the Society archives. It is not a quick or easy job to decide exactly how documents should be stored for future use. Luckily our team has some wonderful real-life librarians! Ann Brown has been leading the archiving team for a while now utilizing procedures from Central Michigan University, following the Society of American Archivists standards, and following the existing procedures used on St. Andrew's Society records in the Burton Library Collection in Detroit. In 2018 Marian Matyn from CMU spent the day with us to see firsthand our archives and to provide us with suggestions and ideas to implement. She also offered her services to us and has been called on since to answer questions. After the Great Flood of 2021, all of the Society documents were moved to the archive storage area of the classroom, space that is integral to the keeping of our Society Archives. We often run out of room here as we receive donations of books, documents, memorabilia, and clothing consistently throughout the year. At the time of writing this article, the archives consist of 50 banker boxes which amount to 10,000-15,000 pages of documents from Society members and officers, past and present among other items. Our volunteers move as guickly as their time allows to sort through these items. Many of these documents are given in duplicate, triplicate, etc. as our officers keep many of the same records. We hope to implement a procedure to have officers and other members send documents electronically so we may file them more easily. Currently we are working on organization at a basic level, which entails separating the documents into categories following Burton standards. When we have gotten our current records sorted, we will begin the next step and organize by the types of documents and year within those categories.

Along with our document organization project, we've had several members organizing our photo collection. Member Sandy McLeod has been working on this project, categorizing the photos by date, event, and member name for a while now, and we've had members - including Linda Davenport - volunteer their time to help. Now with facial recognition technology available, we hope to have an easily searchable database from all of our events. As always, we owe a huge thanks to our Society photographer, Van Rohr, and several others who regularly take photos to record our events for posterity. The Library is thankful to the Communications Committee for the close working relationship we have, which includes providing electronic copies of documents and Society pictures.

Lastly, member Janet Bobby has been creating a database of our artifacts over the last few years. She is doing a wonderful job chipping away at our growing collection of Scottish items.

If you would like to help with any of these projects, you are always welcome to volunteer in the library. We work on the second and fourth Thursdays from 10:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. and the third Saturday after our business meeting, from 11:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. every month. **Any help would be greatly appreciated!**


