Important information regarding changes in operations

- 1. Due to the current financial challenges, we face together as a Society, you may notice a change to how events are ticketed. Notably, we will be adding a processing fee to Online transactions. These fees help the Society cover our costs for the convenience of paying by credit or with a debit card. Cash and checks are still accepted at the Kilgour Scottish Centre. Please contact Kathleene at (248) 526-1849 for in person office hours, or mail to 2363 Rochester Rd, Troy, MI 48083. Payments by phone will no longer be accepted.
- 2. It has come to my attention that we need to utilize a framework to propose and approve events. I will reference The St. Andrew's Society of Detroit Bylaws Section 14.09 The Cultural Activities Director shall:
 - a. Be responsible for the selection of the facilities, the programs, the arrangements, and the refreshments as are deemed appropriate for initiations, installations, the Robert Burns Dinner, the St. Andrew's Dinner, and other meetings of the Society.

With this in mind, I am currently developing processes by which events will be proposed and approved, in line with our recently implemented budget guidelines as well as streamlining the process. This will apply to myself as well as members who want to host a Society event and will include timelines and costs associated with events at the Hall. I am interpreting this to mean that members with proposals for cultural events and activities need to bring their proposals forth, first to the Cultural Events Director and their committee first for refinement, and then the proposal needs to go through that committee to the Executive Committee for final approval.

Moving forward, I am able to accept proposals for events that are a minimum of four months prior to the proposed event date. This will apply even to activities and events that are likely to not need a lot of refinements to their proposals to gain approval from the Executive Board. The reason for this is that multiple people and departments are involved in the development and marketing of all events, and these things need to be done enough ahead of time that we are not overtaxing our volunteers, as well as time for attendees to plan their involvement ahead of time. I will reject proposals that do not have appropriate lead times, for the good of the Society and for the best chance of success in all our events.

I welcome the chance to assist any member or committee that is interested in proposing an event, but requires assistance navigating any aspect of the proposal process, including factoring in all required costs. Proposals that do not demonstrate how we will cover the costs involved will be rejected. This is in keeping with existing policies as well as new and continuing guidance from the Board of Trustees.

I hope this helps clarify how these processes will work as we move forward. Thank you for the opportunity to serve the SASD in this way, and for all your support!

Low Library Book Club

The Low Library Book Club has chosen *Set Adrift Upon the World: the Sutherland Clearances* by James Hunter (416 p.) for its April 14 discussion.

Here is a description of the book:



JAMES HUNTER

They would be better dead, they said, than set adrift upon the world. But in 1821 set adrift they were - thousands of them, their communities destroyed, their homes demolished and burned. Some people died. The land was given over to sheep farmers. Families who were cleared from their tenancies sailed to Canada. Some of the men signed up to fight in Ireland, France, South Africa, and New Orleans when there was little alternative.

Such were the Sutherland Clearances, an extraordinary episode, involving the deliberate depopulation of much of a Scottish county. What was done in the course of that episode was planned and carried out by Britain's wealthiest couple and their employees... Most of those involved wrote a great deal about their actions, intentions, and feelings, and much of it has been preserved. There are no equivalent collections of material from those whose communities ceased to exist.

Here James Hunter tells the story of the Sutherland Clearances - a gripping, moving, definitive account of a people's struggle for survival in the face of tragedy and disaster.

Winner of Saltire Scottish History Book of the Year.



People who have Ehlers-Danlos syndrome usually have overly flexible joints and stretchy, fragile skin. This can become a problem if you have a wound that requires stitches, because the skin often isn't strong enough to hold them.
