

### Low Library Book Club

The Low Library Book Club has chosen *Set Adrift Upon the World: the Sutherland Clearances* by James Hunter (416 p.) for its April 14 discussion.

Here is a description of the book:



JAMES HUNTER

They would be better dead, they said, than set adrift upon the world. But in 1821 set adrift they were - thousands of them, their communities destroyed, their homes demolished and burned. Some people died. The land was given over to sheep farmers. Families who were cleared from their tenancies sailed to Canada. Some of the men signed up to fight in Ireland, France, South Africa, and New Orleans when there was little alternative.

Such were the Sutherland Clearances, an extraordinary episode, involving the deliberate depopulation of much of a Scottish county. What was done in the course of that episode was planned and carried out by Britain's wealthiest couple and their employees... Most of those involved wrote a great deal about their actions, intentions, and feelings, and much of it has been preserved. There are no equivalent collections of material from those whose communities ceased to exist.

Here James Hunter tells the story of the Sutherland Clearances - a gripping, moving, definitive account of a people's struggle for survival in the face of tragedy and disaster.

Winner of Saltire Scottish History Book of the Year.

#### **Legacy Planning**

If you are looking for tax-smart way to make a charitable contribution today, or leave a legacy tomorrow, here are three ways you can support St Andrew's Society of Detroit outside of the traditional giving methods:

- 1. Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCD) for those over age 70 ½ who wish to donate from their IRA accounts directly to SASD without triggering a tax bill for the distribution. (This can satisfy a required minimum distribution)
- Gifting highly appreciated assets for those that have large unrealized capital gains in equity holdings who wish to donate those assets (in kind) and not trigger a capital gains tax bill while having the potential to also take a tax deduction at the same time.
- Updating beneficiary designations for those that have accounts with named beneficiaries including TOD and IRA accounts, you can update the percentages to include SASD directly without making changes to your wills or trusts.

Ehlers-Danlos syndrome is a group of inherited disorders that affect your connective tissues — primarily your skin, joints and blood vessel walls. Connective tissue is a complex mixture of proteins and other substances that provide strength and elasticity to the underlying structures in your body.

People who have Ehlers-Danlos syndrome usually have overly flexible joints and stretchy, fragile skin. This can become a problem if you have a wound that requires stitches, because the skin often isn't strong enough to hold them.
