Option 1: Curling participant ticket \$45 (mobility aids available; see below)

Curling in Scotland dates to the 16th century! Join fellow Scots at the Detroit Curling Club in Ferndale and learn to play or join the cheerleaders (or hecklers) watching from the warm room!

Curlers should arrive a little before 7:30 p.m. to be fitted for shoes, sign a waiver, and be ready for instruction.

Please wear pants that stretch and warmer clothing (no jeans, and no fleece or other materials that may shed on the ice).

All curlers will receive a pair of rental curling shoes. They have grippers on both feet. Curlers will remove the gripper on their sliding foot when they deliver a stone and put it back on after delivery.

Anyone of any age and ability can curl. If you are unable to do the curling "lunge", you will keep your grippers on at all times, and "stick-curl" using an extender stick similar to shuffleboard. (continued on page 6)














## **The Kilgour Centre Fund Drive**

Saving our Kilgour Scottish Centre

A big thank you to those who have donated! In three months, we are over 25% of our \$60,000 goal! Our total donations stand at \$17,196.61 Thank you greatly to those who have donated and those considering their donation.

Some have commented about SASD's \$700,000 in savings and have questioned the need for the Kilgour Centre Fund Drive. Remember, that at several recent meetings we've heard that we are in dire financial straits and, here is why. A few years ago, our savings were about \$1,000,000. We used to pay for maintenance and improvements to the Kilgour Centre with the interest of our savings. Over the past several years, we have had to significantly dip into the principal. In calendar year 2024, repairs and maintenance including re-roofing the Kilgour totaled around \$90,000. Bottom line, total Kilgour expenses increased by \$99.2K from fiscal year 2023 to 2024. In 2025, our fire suppression system underwent major repairs at a cost of about \$19,000. The resurfacing of our main parking lot and resealing of our auxiliary lot was just completed.

The Kilgour Fund Drive's goal is to raise \$60,000 in one year from September 1st, 2025, through August 31st, 2026. Every member is urged to participate in the Kilgour Centre Fund Drive by giving \$200. You could choose to donate \$16.67 monthly, \$50 quarterly, or make a one-time donation of \$200. If donating at that level is too high right now, any size donation would be greatly appreciated.

Your donation can be made by logging into Wild Apricot and going to the "Members' Only" homepage or, through the QR code on the Kilgour Fund business cards located by the front desk inside the Kilgour. ## Off The Shelf... News from the Charles S. Low Memorial Library

#### **Holiday Traditions That Connect Us to Our Scottish Ancestors**

When we research our families, it is easy to focus on documents and names. Those are important, but the traditions our ancestors carried with them can tell an equally meaningful story. Many Scottish families kept customs for generations without fully realizing how deeply rooted they were in their homeland. Looking at these traditions can help us understand where our families came from and what shaped their lives.

December is a natural time to think about the habits our families still honor. Small things such as recipes, songs, or the way we welcome the New Year often have roots that reach back centuries. When we pay attention to them, we uncover hints about where our ancestors lived and what they believed.

Hogmanay is one of the strongest connections to Scotland's past. Many families still remember tales of first-footing, where the first visitor after midnight brought gifts such as coal or shortbread to bring luck for the year ahead. If this custom appears in your family stories, it is worth asking who kept it alive and how far back it might go. These details can even point to regions where the tradition was especially strong, including the Highlands and Western Isles.

Food traditions hold their own clues. Black bun, shortbread, or a New Year's broth often stayed in families long after they left Scotland. If certain recipes were non-negotiable in your household during the holidays, they may be linked to a specific region or a custom passed down through your clan.

Some families also carried forward seasonal rituals tied to the old Scottish calendar. First Foot Day, guising, and winter gatherings connected to local Kirks helped communities get through the darker months. Noticing whether any of these survived in your family can offer insight into how your ancestors lived and celebrated.

You might also see patterns in holiday naming traditions. Children born near Christmas or the New Year were sometimes given meaningful or symbolic names, continuing the long-standing naming practices that guided Scottish families for generations. When several relatives share the same festive name, it can help you make sense of crowded parish records.

These traditions are more than interesting notes in the margins. They help fill in the gaps where written records grow thin and remind us that our ancestors lived full lives shaped by community and ritual. By paying attention to the customs that still appear in our homes during the holiday season, we gain a fuller, more personal picture of where our families came from and how their stories live on through us.

### **Board of Trustees Candidates (continued)**

#### Cliff Les

A lot of you don't know me. That's good.

Not for the obvious reason (I'm actually a pretty nice guy). No, it means that you may have joined the SASD since 2021, when Catherine and I left SE Michigan for Northern California. It would mean that the Society is growing at a healthy pace; it may also mean that the age distribution of our little group is tilting a bit less towards the geriatric. That would be good. Very good.

I'm running for a fourth term (years 10-12) on the BoT. There are some really good reasons why you shouldn't vote for me:

- Leadership atheroscleroses. Should anybody have this kind of management power for this kind of time? "We've always done it this way" has been the death knell of more vigorous institutions than ours.
- 2. My understanding is that we have some really good people running for these positions. You should pay close attention to them, and see if their long-term goals for the Society line up with yours.
- 3. I live 2300 miles away. Right off the bat, that makes me effectively ineligible for Chair BoT, Vice Chair BoT, or House Chair. Since the pandemic, we've found that we can indeed run a BoT meeting without a Board Room (maybe freeing up some much-needed space at Kilgour??). But there are some people who need to be able to be onsite in a hurry if need be. I wouldn't be able to do that.

Some reasons why you might consider voting for me:

- Experience: The first 18 months on the BoT is like getting a drink of water out of a firehose.
   Our high-level finances are complex, and there's a lot of moving parts. Mentorship to newer members of the BoT can be an important contribution to the Society.
- 2. Specifically, consider the Investment Committee, on which I've served. When I was first elected to the BoT, our total investments were \$1.8M. On 31 October 25, they were \$2.3M. That's with zero deposits, a major flood, a lot of benevolences, and a new roof. Did I do that? Of course not; I'm just a dumb horse doc. But I know how to draft and maintain an investment policy a decade in advance, and how to pick financial advisors who can stick to that policy, and how to watch them closely while they work their magic. Find smart people with integrity, pay them fairly, and then let them do their thing. And watch them like a hawk.
- 3. I live 2300 miles away. I will never be the winemaker, but always the worker in the vineyard. I'm ok with that. I'm more of an institutional-memory than an institutional-power kind of guy.
- 4. We're entering a new phase in BoT operations: We're finally moving away from management-by-fire-alarm, and starting to build procedures to account for the inevitable surprises. I'd like to continue being a part of that.

Please consider all of the candidates, and vote as if the long-term financial and cultural survival of the Society depends on it. Because it does.






